## LIPPIZANER STALLIONS

### A Working Bibliography of MHI Sources

The famed Lippizaner stallions of Vienna, sometimes known as the Austrian or Spanish Riding School, were bred at Hostoun, Czechoslovakia, which the U.S. 2<sup>nd</sup> Cavalry Group (attached to the 90<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division) liberated on 29-30 April 1945. At least one of the liberated mares at the Czech breeding station reached the Aleshire Remount Station, Front Royal, VA. See:
