The term "knee guards" appears in the 1851 <u>Manual on Mountain Artillery</u>. Other sources make references to leg guards, protective leather shields worn on the outside of the rider-driver's inner leg as protection against the second horse of the tandem. As the finger stall had evolved into the thumb stall, so the knee guard may have become the leg guard. See:
