20TH CENTURY-1916-17 Purge

Presently the US Army recognizes 1200 Medals of Honor for Civil War valor and gallantry. The special Army board of 1916-17, which was charged by act of Congress to review all the Medals of Honor awarded up to that time, ordered 911 stricken from the list. Nearly all of those stricken were awards made during the Civil War years. Only five were not. Therefore, the total number of Civil War Medal of Honor awards before 1917 must have been about 2100.
