### **MEXICAN BORDER & PUNITIVE EXPEDITION, 1916-1917**

In Sep 1914 Brown assumed command of 10<sup>th</sup> Cavalry at Ft Huachuca. From Oct to Dec, troops were under occasional fire at Naco, AZ. In Nov 1915, the 10th patrolled the border between Douglas and Nogales during the struggle between Villa and Carranza forces. Finally, in Mar 916, Brown led the 10th into Mexico on the Punitive Expedition. Several letters and clippings to his sisters cover these events.
