HORSESHOE CREEK, WYOMING, 2 Dec 1869

According to Record of Engagements with Hostile Indians within the Military Division of the Missouri from 1868 to 1882, compiled by the division (Wash, DC: GPO, 1882; E83.866.U555), p. 25, about 150 Indians attacked a mail escort of ten men under Sergeant Bahr of Company E, 4th Infantry, enroute to Ft Laramie. One soldier was reported killed. Apparently the escort was attacked a second time that same day, when two men were wounded.

A slightly different account appears in <u>Chronological List of Actions</u>, etc, <u>With Indians from January 1</u>, <u>1866</u>, to <u>January</u>, <u>1891</u>, prepared by the Adjutant General's Office. According to p. 21, the action occurred on 1 Dec 1869, with Sgt Conrad Bahr, Co E, in charge. Three men were reported wounded.

Unfortunately, a search in our pertinent holdings uncovered no report specifically on the Horseshoe Creek engagement(s). See these histories:

Additional information on the episode might be found in the pertinent monthly returns of the regiment and of Ft Laramie, not on file here but available on National Archives microfilm. Rolls No 44-47 of Microcopy 666 contain the 4th's returns from 1851 through 1888 (Roll No 46 covers 1867-1875). Ft Laramie's returns for 1861--876 are on Roll No 596 of Microcopy 617.

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According to the <u>Army & Navy Reg</u>ister article cited below, Ft Keogh's Troops L & M, 6th Cavalry Regiment, were sent into the field as an escort for a supply train in Nov 1906. On Nov 4th, this command, under Captain (George P.?) White, arrived at the encampment of the troops who had been sent into the Powder-Tongue River area in late October. The initial force was comprised of two squadrons of 10th Cavalry Regiment from Ft Robinson, NE, two companies of 4th InfantryRegiment from Ft Mackenzie, WY, and six troops of 6th Cavalry from Ft Meade, SD.
