VIRGINIA HALL, ALLIED AGENT, WWII

Virginia Hall, a U.S. citizen and foreign correspondent for the New York Post, worked for British SOE in France, 1941-1942, and later for the American OSS. She returned to France in Mar 1944, allegedly parachuting into Brittany while carrying her artificial leg named "Cuthbert." William Donovan, head of OSS, recommended her for the DSC to President Roosevelt in a 12 May 1945 memo and stated that she would be the first woman in the war to receive the award. Although no mention of her award was found in our sources, MILPERCEN Awards Branch (WO Thayer) has a list of OSS award recipients that includes Virginia Hall's name and indicates presentation of the DSC on 27 Sep 1945. She died in 1982.

EUROPEAN OPERATIONS-U.S. Parachutists, Burgundy, France, Jul-Aug 1944

In Aug 1944, the two Allied forces moved toward a junction in the Dijon area: 12th Army Group from Normandy and the Seventh U.S. Army from the French Riviera. Both included airborne units. No indication surfaced that either force sent airborne units into the Cote d'Or area. Among sources consulted:

EUROPEAN OPERATIONS-163rd SSS Force

Although no history of the 163d SSS Force is on file here, the few fragments of pertinent info uncovered suggest that it was a detachment of the Office of Strategic Services (OSS). According to Seventh Army's Report of Operations, Vol. 3 (03-7-1946), pp. 911 and 1063, its intelligence organization included a Special Service Section [SSS] identified parenthetically as OSS. Likewise suggestive:
