SAAR-MOSELLE TRIANGLE

Clearing the triangle fell to Third Army's XX Corps, commencing November 1944 after the capture of Metz. The German counteroffensive in the Ardennes delayed conclusive operations until mid-Feb 1945, which were accomplished by the 94th Infantry Division & then the 10th Armored Division, with brief support from elements of the 8th Armored Division. XX Corps units cleared Trier by 2 Mar 1945. See:
